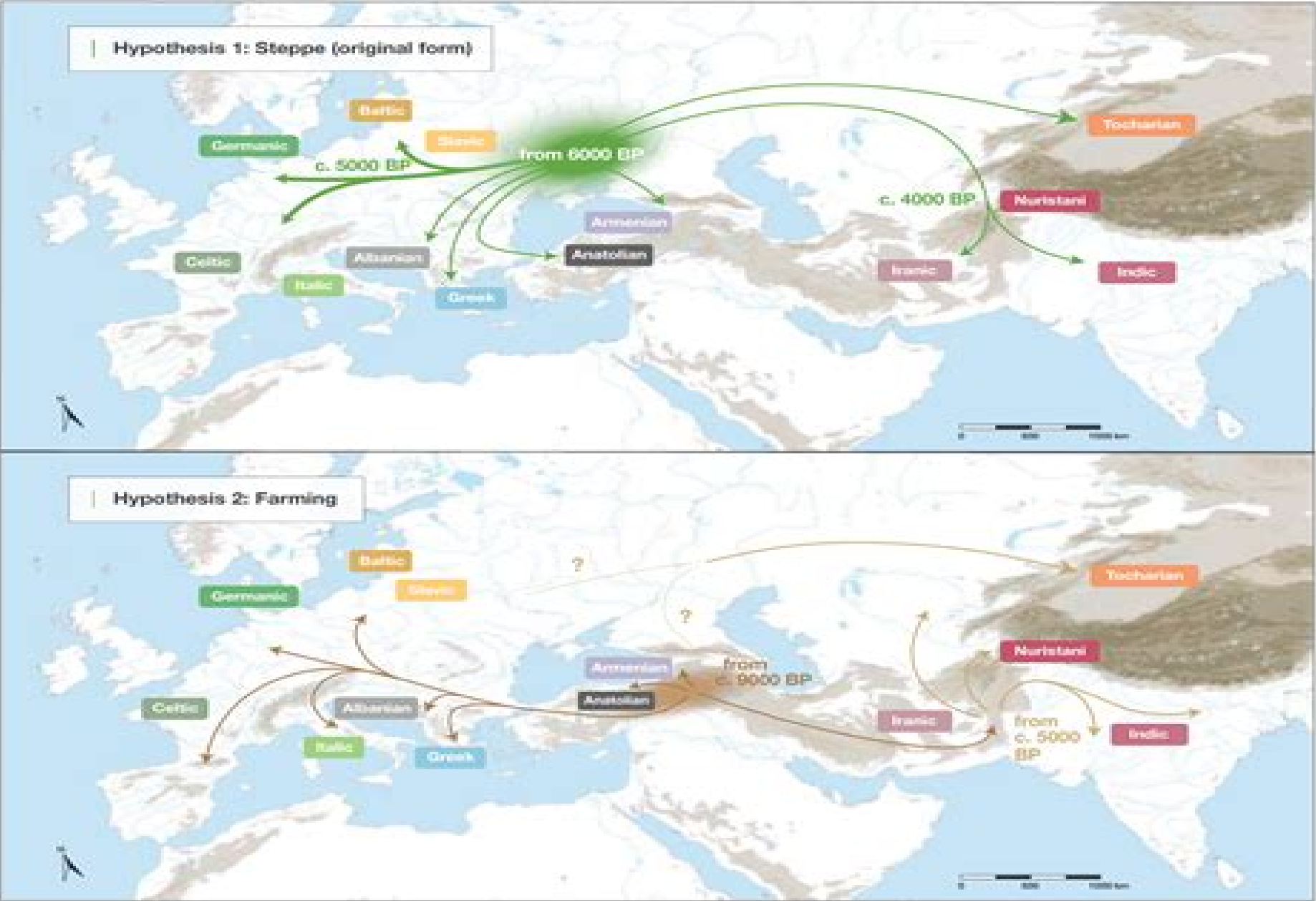

Non human animals communicate in simple ways they may be able to form simple concepts to feel some limited empathy for others to cooperate to some extent and to engage in mind reading. After the first simple beginnings human language underwent an explosion of complexity leading to the very complicated systems of grammar and pronunciation found in modern languages.
