The Nature of Buddhist Ethics Damien Keown, 2016-07-27 In this book the author considers data from both early and later schools of Buddhism in an attempt to provide an overall characterization of the structure of Buddhist ethics The importance of ethics in the Buddha's teachings is widely acknowledged but the pursuit of ethical ideals has up to now been widely held to be secondary to the attainment of knowledge Drawing on the Aristotelian tradition of ethics the author argues against this intellectualization of Buddhism and in favour of a new understanding of the tradition in terms of which ethics plays an absolutely central role In the course of this reassessment many basic concepts such as karma nirvana and the Eightfold Path are reviewed and presented in a fresh light The book will be of interest to readers with a background in either Buddhist studies or comparative religious ethics

With this framework Garfield explores the connections between Buddhist ethics and recent work in moral particularism such as that of Jonathan Dancy as well as the British and Scottish sentimental tradition represented by Hume and Smith *Zen Buddhism and Environmental Ethics* Simon P. Davis, 2018-07-18 This volume of essays offers direct comparisons of historic Western and Buddhist perspectives on ethics and metaphysics tracing parallels and contrasts all the way from Plato to the Stoics Spinoza to Hume and Schopenhauer through to contemporary ethicists such as Arne Naess Charles Taylor and Derek Parfit It compares and contrasts each Western philosopher with a particular strand in the Buddhist tradition in some chapters represented by individual writers such as Nagarjuna Vasubandhu Santideva or Tsong Khapa It does so in light of both analytic concerns and themes from the existentialist and phenomenological traditions and often in an ecumenical spirit that bridges both analytic and continentalist approaches Some of the deepest questions in ethics dealing with the scope of agency value laden notions of personhood and the nature of value in general are intertwined with questions in metaphysics One set of questions addresses how varying conceptions of selfhood relate to moral values e g the concern of self or selves for the well being of others another set of questions addresses how a conception of oneself or one s selves should or should not affect how one thinks of happiness or eudaimonia or in classical Indian terms artha sukha or nirvana Western philosophy has featured discussion of both but some would argue that certain traditions of Asian philosophy have offered a more sustained and even treatment of both sets of questions The Buddhist tradition in particular has not only featured much discussion on both fronts but has attracted many contemporary philosophers to its distinctive spectrum of approaches and to what is from many Western points of view a seemingly subversive analysis of ego selfhood and personhood whether in metaphysical phenomenological or other incarnations *Buddhist Ethics is Itself and Not Another Thing* Aaron Schultz, 2015 In recent scholarship an ongoing debate about Buddhist ethics has been taking place On one side some adhere to the position that Buddhist ethics resembles consequentialism One noteworthy figure Charles Goodman has written on this subject at length in a book titled *The Consequences of Compassion* Others hold that Buddhist ethics is akin to Aristotelean virtue ethics Damien Keown is a key proponent of this view which he argues in a work titled *The Nature of Buddhist Ethics* Both of these views attempt to offer the best interpretation of Buddhist ethics so that it can better understood and analyzed In the pages that follow I will argue for two claims First both Goodman and Keown make crucial errors in their methodology by failing to lay out the best set of necessary conditions for virtue ethics and consequentialism I aim to shed light on this methodological error and to offer a basis of comparison that is more precise Having recalibrated the starting point of this debate by setting out the necessary conditions virtue ethics and consequentialism I develop my second main claim viz that a

third distinct approach to interpreting Buddhist ethics is available

Development of Buddhist Ethics Girija Shankar Prasad Misra, 1984 Description Religion is a doing and doing what is moral In Buddhism particularly there is such a great emphasis on moral doing that is very often designated as an ethical religion silaparaka dharma The present work seeks to study Buddhist ethics as a development process not only in terms of inner dynamics of Buddhism inherent in its doctrinal and ethical formulations but also in terms of its response to various historical compulsions which motivated its followers to introduce in its general framework novelties of forms and expressions It is hoped that such an approach would lead to a greater appreciation of Buddhist ethics both as an emergent of a unique spiritual vision and a social force The book which is divided in six chapters cover the entire range of Buddhist development in India The work is novel both in its approach and treatment of the subject It studies conceptual formulations in their proper historical contexts Modern debates on various ethical problems have been taken into account to bring about greater clarity in discussions

Dealing with Bioethical Issues in a Globalized World Joris Gielen, 2020-01-09 This book addresses the complexity of talking about normativity in bioethics within the context of contemporary multicultural and multi religious society It offers original contributions by specialists in bioethics exploring new ways of understanding normativity in bioethics In bioethical publications and debates the concept of normativity is often used without consideration of the difficulties surrounding it whereas there are many competing claims for normativity within bioethics Examples of such competing normative bioethical discourses can be perceived in variations and differences in bioethical arguments within individual religions and the opposition between bioethical arguments from specific religions and arguments from bioethicists who do not claim religious allegiance We also cannot merely assume that a Western understanding of normative bioethics will be unproblematic in bioethics in non Western cultures and religions Through an analysis of normativity in Christian Hindu Buddhist Islamic and Jewish bioethics the book creates awareness of the complexity of normativity in bioethics The book also covers normative bioethics outside an explicitly religiously committed context and specific attention is paid to bioethics as an interdisciplinary endeavor It reveals how normativity relates to empirical and global bioethics which challenges it faces in bioethics in secular pluralistic society and how to overcome these By doing that this book fills an important gap in bioethics literature
