John Vanbrugh, a playwright, designed Blenheim Palace; the poet Alexander Pope offered architectural drawings for redesigning the houses of friends; and Horace Walpole claimed that the home he renovated, Strawberry Hill, inspired his novel *The Castle of Otranto*. The fruit of his argument is a unique intellectual history of late 17th and early 18th century Britain of use to scholars of architectural history and landscape architecture as well as of literature.
