Conder, 2021-03-17 In this closely reasoned study John J Conder has created a new and more vital understanding of naturalism in American literature Moving from the Hobbesian dilemma between causation and free will down through Bergson s concept of dual selves Conder defines a view of determinism so rich in possibilities that it can serve as the inspiration of literary works of astonishing variety and unite them in a single though developing naturalistic tradition in American letters At the heart of this book beyond its philosophic discussion is Conder s reading of key works in the naturalistic canon beginning with Stephen Crane s *The Open Boat* and *The Blue Hotel* The special character of determinism in Crane is Conder holds the source of his complexity and striking originality He finds a stricter determinism in Norris s *McTeague* In Dreiser however the naturalistic tradition develops toward a fusion of determinism and freedom in a single work and this fusion in a different guise operates in Dos Passos s view of self in *Manhattan Transfer* With Steinbeck s *The Grapes of Wrath* the uniting of determinism and freedom finds its fullest realization in the concept of dual selves one determined one free In Faulkner s *The Sound and the Fury* and *Absalom Absalom* the concept of the dual self appears in its most complex form The developments in the work of Steinbeck and Faulkner Conder believes bring the classic phase of American literary naturalism to a close *Naturalism in American Fiction* illuminates a group of major literary works and revives a theoretic consideration of naturalism It thus makes a fundamental contribution to American studies [A Companion to American Fiction, 1865 - 1914](#) Robert Paul Lamb, G. generalization It is virtually impossible for example to extract from the novels and manifestoes of American writers of this period any consistent definitions of realism or naturalism as modes of literary representation Rather than seek common traits in widely divergent realist and naturalist literary works Michael Davitt Bell focuses here on the role that these terms played in the social and literary discourse of the 1880s and 1890s Bell argues that in America realism and naturalism never achieved the sort of theoretical rigor that they did in European literary debate Instead the function of these ideas in America was less aesthetic than ideological promoting as reality a version of social normalcy based on radically anti literary and heavily gendered assumptions What effects Bell asks did ideas about realism and naturalism have on writers who embraced and resisted them To answer this question he devotes separate chapters to the work of Howells and Frank Norris the principal American advocates of realism and naturalism in the 1880s and 1890s Mark Twain Henry James Stephen Crane Theodore Dreiser and Sarah Orne Jewett Bell reveals that a chief function of claiming to be a realist or a naturalist was to provide assurance that one was a real man rather than an effeminate artist Since the 1880s Bell asserts all serious American fiction writers have had to contend with this problematic conception of literary realism The true story of the transformation of American fiction after the Civil War is the history of this contention a history of individual accommodations evasions holding actions and occasional triumphs

fatales Since heredity and environment are the determining factors in their lives they are victims who have no control However with characters such as Trina Sieppe in Frank Norris's *McTeague* Caroline Meeber in Theodore Dreiser's *Sister Carrie* Edna Pontellier in Kate Chopin's *The Awakening* and Helga Crane in Nella Larsen's *Quicksand* these women victims gradually turn themselves into victimizers in order to conquer both heredity and environment They consciously and deliberately use the only power they have that can help them overcome the naturalistic world in which they are entrapped the power of the feminine The book explains who exactly the femme fatale that has been born out of American naturalism is and explores images of women in American realism who precede the femme fatale of American naturalism This study examines characters like Trina Sieppe Caroline Meeber Edna Pontellier and Helga Crane It analyzes these women's backgrounds their demeanors their temperaments their experiences and their settings and explains how and when each woman decides to use her sexuality There is also a brief discussion of other femmes fatales in American naturalism such as Stephen Crane's *Maggie A Girl of the Streets* Although the perception of women in nineteenth century American literature has always had its place in discussions of literary texts this book is unique in its argument that women in American naturalism are neither weak nor passive but rather are strong and daring women who try diligently to find a means of fighting back This book is an important addition to collections in literature and Women's studies **Frank Norris'**

Theodore Dreiser Revisited Philip L. Gerber, 1992 In his life and in his work Theodore Dreiser was nothing if not genuinely American True to the American dream he overcame a childhood characterized largely by its impoverishment material social educational and emotional to attain a large measure of success The territory of his novels is often the territory of his childhood life unadorned in the great industrial cities of early modern America In *Theodore Dreiser Revisited* Philip Gerber argues that Dreiser's life is woven inextricably into his novels Like Dreiser many of his characters struggle to escape their meager often shabby existences but generally with much less success than their creator Dreiser identified with the ordinary man and woman of the early twentieth century He depicted their position as the tiniest of cogs in the colossal American industrial machine with unflinching realism making him a herald of literary naturalism In this revised and expanded edition of his earlier effort Gerber places Dreiser at the very brink of the naturalist tradition He traces the influence of its progenitor Emile Zola on the short-lived American writers Stephen Crane and Frank Norris and shows Dreiser to be the only American writer of note to pursue the naturalist course after Crane's and Norris's deaths In setting this course Dreiser would ultimately secure a lasting place for himself in the canon of American literature But in his own day especially early in his career the world view he expressed in his books led to controversy and censorship Dreiser saw the human condition as a lonely and fragile one in which men and women are easily overwhelmed by the forces that surround them the destructive effects of capitalism greed materialism and lust on the individual are all laid bare in his novels The frankness with which he conveyed this idea disturbed his early readers and led to the condemnation of his first and now highly regarded novel *Sister Carrie* published in 1900 It was not until 1925 with the publication of Dreiser's masterpiece *An American Tragedy* that his contemporaries seemed ready to reward him with resounding praise Since Dreiser's death in 1945 and particularly in the 25 years since Twayne's first edition of *Theodore Dreiser* was published criticism of his novels has burgeoned Gerber has added several chapters to this new edition that assess the evolution of Dreiser scholarship Despite the abundance of biographical textual and bibliographic material now available Gerber expects promising research to continue in
