story behind them New England's Hidden Past takes readers to the grave sites of revolutionary heroines Loyalist house museums as well as Revolutionary taverns and colonial inns It takes them to Indian trails the oldest houses historic department stores ghost towns and Little Italys Each unique interesting location or object has a counterpart in the other five New England states A perfect guide to keep in the car and refer to when traveling New England or planning a trip *Life and Death Decisions* Sheldon Ekland-Olson, 2013 This book discusses the American euthanasia movement debates over the boundaries between abortion and infanticide hastened death and euthanasia tolerable and intolerable suffering suicide and refusal of medical treatment and lynching and capital punishment **Dogtown** Elyssa East, 2009-12 The area known as Dogtown an isolated colonial ruin and surrounding 3 000 acre woodland in storied seaside Gloucester Massachusetts has long exerted a powerful influence over artists writers eccentrics and nature lovers But its history is also woven through with tales of witches supernatural sightings pirates former slaves drifters and the many dogs Revolutionary War widows kept for protection and for which the area was named In 1984 a brutal murder took place there a mentally disturbed local outcast crushed the skull of a beloved schoolteacher as she walked in the woods Dogtown's peculiar atmosphere it is strewn with giant boulders and has been compared to Stonehenge and eerie past deepened the pall of this horrific event that continues to haunt Gloucester even today In alternating chapters Elyssa East interlaces the story of this grisly murder with the strange dark history of this wilderness ghost town and explores the possibility that certain landscapes wield their own unique power East knew nothing of Dogtown's bizarre past when she first became interested in the area As an art student in the early 1990s she fell in love with the celebrated Modernist painter Marsden Hartley's stark and arresting Dogtown landscapes She also learned that in the 1930s Dogtown saved Hartley from a paralyzing depression Years later struggling in her own life East set out to find the mysterious setting that had changed Hartley's life hoping that she too would find solace and renewal in Dogtown's odd beauty Instead she discovered a landscape steeped in intrigue and a community deeply ambivalent about the place while many residents declare their passion for this profoundly affecting landscape others avoid it out of a sense of foreboding Throughout this richly braided first person narrative East brings Dogtown's enigmatic past to life Losses sustained during the American Revolution dealt this once thriving community its final blow Destitute war widows and former slaves took up shelter in its decaying homes until 1839 when the last inhabitant was taken to the poorhouse He died seven days later Dogtown has remained abandoned ever since but continues to occupy many people's imaginations In addition to Marsden Hartley it inspired a Bible thumping millionaire who carved the region's rocks with words to live by the innovative and influential postmodernist poet Charles Olson who based much of his epic *Maximus Poems* on Dogtown an idiosyncratic octogenarian who vigilantly patrols the land to this day and a murderer who claimed that the spirit of the woods called out to him In luminous insightful prose Dogtown takes the reader into an unforgettable place brimming with tragedy eccentricity and fascinating lore and examines the idea that some places can inspire both good and evil poetry and murder *Killed*

Strangely Elaine Forman Crane, 2014-04-11 It was Rebecca's son Thomas who first realized the victim's identity. His eyes were drawn to the victim's head and aided by the flickering light of a candle he clapped his hands and cried out "Oh Lord it is my mother." James Moills, a servant of Cornell, described Rebecca lying on the floor with fire about her from her lower parts near to the fireplace. He recognized her only by her shoes from the killed. *Strangely* On a winter's evening in 1673 tragedy descended on the respectable Rhode Island household of Thomas Cornell. His 73-year-old mother Rebecca was found close to her bedroom's large fireplace dead and badly burned. The legal owner of the Cornells' hundred acres along Narragansett Bay, Rebecca shared her home with Thomas and his family, a servant and a lodger. A coroner's panel initially declared her death an Unhappy Accident but before summer arrived a dark web of events, rumors of domestic abuse, allusions to witchcraft even the testimony of Rebecca's ghost through her brother resulted in Thomas's trial for matricide. Such were the ambiguities of the case that others would be tried for the murder as well. Rebecca is a direct ancestor of Cornell University's founder Ezra Cornell. Elaine Forman Crane tells the compelling story of Rebecca's death and its aftermath vividly depicting the world in which she lived. That world included a legal system where jurors were expected to be familiar with the defendant and case before the trial even began. Rebecca's strange death was an event of cataclysmic proportions affecting not only her own community but neighboring towns as well. The documents from Thomas's trial provide a rare glimpse into seventeenth-century life. Crane writes, "Instead of the harmony and respect that sermon literature laws and a hierarchical patriarchal society attempted to impose, evidence illustrates filial insolence, generational conflict, disrespect toward the elderly, power plays between mother-in-law and daughter-in-law and adult dependence on and resentment of aging parents who clung to purse strings." Yet even at a distance of more than three hundred years, Rebecca Cornell's story is poignantly familiar. Her complaints of domestic abuse, Crane says, went largely unheeded by friends and neighbors until at last their complacency was shattered by her terrible death.

The death penalty arouses our passions as does few other issues. Some view taking another person's life as just and reasonable punishment, while others see it as an inhumane and barbaric act. But the intensity of feeling that capital punishment provokes often obscures its long and varied history in this country. Now for the first time we have a comprehensive history of the death penalty in the United States. Law professor Stuart Banner tells the story of how over four centuries dramatic changes have taken place in the ways capital punishment has been administered and experienced. In the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries the penalty was standard for a laundry list of crimes, from adultery to murder, from arson to stealing horses. Hangings were public events staged before audiences numbering in the thousands, attended by women and men, young and old, black and white alike. Early on the gruesome spectacle had explicitly religious purposes: an event replete with sermons, confessions, and last-minute penitence to promote the salvation of both the condemned and the crowd. Through the nineteenth century the execution became desacralized, increasingly secular and private, in response to changing mores. In the twentieth and twenty-first centuries, ironically as it has become a quiet, sanitary, technological procedure, the death penalty is as divisive as ever. By recreating what it was like to be the condemned, the executioner, and the spectator, Banner moves beyond the debates to give us an unprecedented understanding of capital punishment's many meanings. As nearly four thousand inmates are now on death row and almost one hundred are currently being executed each year, the furious debate is unlikely to diminish. The Death Penalty is invaluable in understanding the American way of the ultimate punishment.
