

## B. Sociolinguistics and Dialectology

- ▶ Dialectology is a study of geographical varieties of language. From the definition dialectology seems to be a part of sociolinguistics areas. However, there are at least two main differences between the two.
- ▶ First, dialectology is interested in historical development of language varieties and it survey mainly the comparison between the dialects and the standard code, whereas sociolinguistics is more interested in synchronic analysis and describes the relations between the language varieties and the social dynamism.
- ▶ Secondly, dialectologists are concerned with analyzing various linguistics forms and the cognates, while sociolinguistics takes the as important objects of analysis only when the social issues are correlated to them. After all, both share interests in language varieties and the significance of them in understanding the concept and idea of a language.
