*Mexican Portraits* Dorothy Hoobler, Thomas Hoobler, 1993 Presents biographical sketches of Nezahualcoyotl Moctezume II Malinche Juan Diego Diego de la Cruz Juana Ines de la Cruz Father Miguel Hidalgo Benito Juarez Pancho Villa Emiliano Zapata Diego Rivera Frida Kahlo and Amalia Hernandez **Painting a New World** Donna Pierce, Rogelio Ruiz Gomar, Clara Bargellini, Frederick and Jan Mayer Center for Pre-Columbian and Spanish Colonial Art, 2004-05-01 The little known story of viceregal Mexico is told by an international team of scholars whose work was previously available only piecemeal or not at all in English Much of their research was undertaken especially for this volume **BOOK JACKET** **María Izquierdo and Frida Kahlo** Nancy Duffebach, 2015-08-15 Mar a Izquierdo 1902 1955 and Frida Kahlo 1907 1954 were the first two Mexican women artists to achieve international recognition During the height of the Mexican muralist movement they established successful careers as easel painters and created work that has become an integral part of Mexican modernism Although the iconic Kahlo is now more famous the two artists had comparable reputations during their lives Both were regularly included in major exhibitions of Mexican art and they were invariably the only women chosen for the most important professional activities and honors In a deeply informed study that prioritizes critical analysis over biographical interpretation Nancy Duffebach places Kahlo's and Izquierdo's oeuvres in their cultural context examining the ways in which the artists participated in the national and artistic discourses of postrevolutionary Mexico Through iconographic analysis of paintings and themes within each artist's oeuvre Duffebach discusses how the artists engaged intellectually with the issues and ideas of their era especially Mexican national identity and the role of women in society In a time when Mexican artistic and national discourses associated the nation with masculinity Izquierdo and Kahlo created images of women that deconstructed gender roles critiqued the status quo and presented more empowering alternatives for women Duffebach demonstrates that paradoxically Kahlo and Izquierdo became the most successful Mexican women artists of the modernist period while most directly challenging the prevailing ideas about gender and what constitutes important art **Mexican Portraits** Vesta Monica Herreras, 2013 In the history of photography in Mexico portraiture is an important established tradition transcending styles subjects and decades Mexican Portraits includes more than 350 portraits from more than 80 well known Mexican photographers including Romualdo Garcia Agustn V Casasola Manuel lvarez Bravo Enrique Metinides and Graciela Iturbide among numerous others Including both contemporary and classic works mostly created in the years from the 1970s to the present this diverse group of images has been selected by photographer and editor Pablo Ortiz Monsasterio in conjunction with curator Vesta Monica Herreras and presents an idiosyncratic and personal perspective on this particular genre Mexican Portraits explores the frontiers of portraiture from very different perspectives and associations At the center of his wide ranging selection are two distinct notions embedded in the history of the portrait mask and metamorphosis Organized into nine chapters this beautifully illustrated book is a reflection on Mexican portraiture and identity both individual and

collective Among the photographers represented here are Manuel lvarez Bravo Graciela Iturbide Pedro Meyer Agust n V Casasola I aki Bonillas Maya Goded Fernando Montiel Klimt Gerardo Montiel Klimt Guillermo Kahlo Rodrigo Moya Dr Lakra Carla Verea Stefan Ruiz Melquiades Herrera Ana Casas Daniela Rosell Francis Al s Carlos Somonte Miguel Calder n Adolfo Pati o Juan Guzm n and Eunice Adorno Romualdo Garc a and Enrique Metinides an astonishing roll call that itself articulates Mexican photographers special relationship to portraiture **Essays on Mexican Art** Octavio Paz, 1993 Octavio Paz probes the mystery of pre Columbian art its otherness its unique concept of time and connects it to the ideas of Baudelaire and Nietzsche He tells the estory of Hermenegildo Bustos a self taught painter in a remote Mexican village and compares his work to the sarcophagi portraits of the Egyptian Fayum He demonstrates how the Mexican muralists Rivera Siqueiros Orozco were influenced by European Cubism Fauvism Expressionism and how they in turn influenced American painters Gorky Rothko Pollock The abstract art of Tamayo evokes for him the music of Bela Bart k and the canvases of Mar a Izquierdo suggest the poetry of Apollinaire In these fourteen wide ranging essays Paz makes art philosophy religion and the history of the world converge as he celebrates the richness of Mexico Publisher s description p 2 of dust jacket **OUT OF THE VOLCANO** PB PEDEN MARGARET SAYER, 1991-11-17 Offers interviews with Mexican playwrights sculptors poets novelists photographers critics choreographers architects and weavers *The Covarrubias Circle* Peter Mears, 2004 New York in the 1920s and 1930s was a modernist mecca that drew artists writers and other creators of culture from around the globe Two such expatriates were Mexican artist and Renaissance man Miguel Covarrubias and Hungarian photographer Nickolas Muray Their lifelong friendship gave Muray an entr e into Covarrubias s circle of fellow Mexican artists Frida Kahlo Rufino Tamayo Juan Soriano Fernando Castillo Guillermo Meza Roberto Montenegro and Rafael Navarro whose works Muray collected This outstanding body of Mexican modernist art now owned by the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center HRC at the University of Texas at Austin forms the subject of this beautifully illustrated volume Produced in conjunction with the Ransom Center s exhibition Miguel Covarrubias A Certain Clairvoyance this volume contains color plates of virtually all the items in Nickolas Muray s collection of twentieth century Mexican art The majority of the works are by Covarrubias while the excellent works by the other artists reflect the range of aesthetic shifts and modernist influences of the period in Mexico Accompanying the plates are five original essays that establish Covarrubias s importance as a modernist impresario as influential in his sphere as Ezra Pound T S Eliot and Jean Cocteau were in theirs Likewise the essays reestablish the significance of Nickolas Muray whose success as a master of color photography portraiture advertising imagery and commercial illustration has made him difficult to place within the history of photography as a fine art As a whole this publication of the Nickolas Muray Collection vividly illustrates the transgression of generic boundaries and the cross fertilization among artists working in different media from painting and photography to dance and ethnography that gave modernism its freshness and energy It also demonstrates that American modernism was thoroughly infused with a fervor for

all things Mexican of which Covarrubias was a principal proponent and that Mexican modernists no less than their American and European counterparts answered Pound's call to make it new *A Guide to Mexican Art* Justino Fernández, 1969-08-15 *A Guide to Mexican Art* a survey of more than twenty centuries of art has a double purpose. It provides an ample version of one of the great national arts by a leading art historian and it serves simultaneously as a practical guide to the art's outstanding masterpieces. The Guide will thus be of value to specialists and students of Latin American art and to sightseers as an introduction and guide to the art and architecture of Mexico. To facilitate its use for the latter purpose Professor Fernández has based his exposition on the sensitive analysis of works to be found almost exclusive in museums and public buildings accessible to the tourist. The book was originally published in Spanish in 1958 and revised in 1961. This English translation from the second edition has been brought up to date by the author and translator *Mexican Costumbrismo* Mey-Yen Moriuchi, 2018-04-03. The years following Mexican independence in 1821 were critical to the development of social, racial and national identities. The visual arts played a decisive role in this process of self definition. Mexican Costumbrismo reorients current understanding of this key period in the history of Mexican art by focusing on a distinctive genre of painting that emerged between 1821 and 1890: costumbrismo. In contrast to the neoclassical work favored by the Mexican academy, costumbrista artists portrayed the quotidian lives of the lower to middle classes: their clothes, food, dwellings and occupations. Based on observations of similitude and difference, costumbrista imagery constructed stereotypes of behavioral and biological traits associated with distinct racial and social classes. In doing so, Mey Yen Moriuchi argues, these works engaged with notions of universality and difference, contributed to the documentation and reification of social and racial types and transformed the way Mexicans saw themselves as well as how other nations saw them during a time of rapid change for all aspects of national identity. Carefully researched and featuring more than thirty full color exemplary reproductions of period work, Moriuchi's study is a provocative art historical examination of costumbrismo's lasting impact on Mexican identity and history. Was the Royal Academy of San Carlos founded in 1785 by the King of Spain beneficial or detrimental to the development of a valid living art in Mexico? The answer lies in the archives of the school but nobody thought about constructing an aesthetic history from them until Jean Charlot accidentally discovered their extent and interest while searching for other material. In this straightforward documented account he presents not merely opinions and criticism but evidence including curricula and contemporary drawings by students and teachers. Since Pre Conquest art there

have been it is usually assumed two periods in Mexican art the Colonial and the Modern Between these peaks lies the dark Academy dominated hiatus called Neo Classicism an episode that this treatise makes the first attempt to understand The academic canons imported from Europe during this period were undeniably wrong for the indigenous people and especially wrong at a time when a revolutionary Mexico was struggling for its own identity But instead of throwing out this strange episode as foreign and imitative it now becomes possible to see it as a period of acculturation through which the Mexican spirit emerged Aside from its interest as aesthetic history this book makes an important contribution to the social history of Mexico Some provocative ideas emerge the interrelations between cultural and political attitudes the historical impact of events and personalities on ideology In the seesaw of political and financial fortunes the worst moments of confusion were often the most pregnant artistically with mexicanidad rising inevitably when official guidance weakened As social history this account constitutes an interesting parallel to similar cultural experiences in the United States and in other countries of the Americas Charlot presents this material without special pleading but not without appraisal He writes in the periods when the Academy was most strictly run along academic lines it helped the young by contrast to realize the meaning of freedom When the school was manned by men blind to the Mexican tradition and sensitive only to European values their stubborn stand became a most healthy invitation to artistic revolution
