Black, 2000 Why did the Victorians collect with such a vengeance and exhibit in museums Focusing on this key nineteenth century enterprise Barbara J Black illuminates British culture of the period by examining the cultural power that this collecting and exhibiting possessed Through its museums she argues Victorian London constructed itself as a world city Using the tools of cultural criticism social history and literary analysis Black roots Victorian museum culture in key political events and cultural forces British imperialism exploration and tourism advances in science and changing attitudes about knowledge the commitment to improved public taste through mass education the growth of middle class dominance and the resulting bourgeois fetishism and commodity culture and the democratization of luxury engendered by the French and industrial revolutions She covers a wide range of genres from poetry to museum guidebooks to the triple decker novel and treats three London museums as case studies Sir John Soane s house museum the Natural History Museum and the exemplary South Kensington While On Exhibit provides a fascinating analysis of Victorian society it also reminds us how modern the Victorians were how in crucial ways our culture derives from the Victorian era Forging connections among museums urbanism and modernity Black provokes us to examine cultural imperialism and the costs and advantages of cultural consensus

By examining urban identities through the cultural lens of the municipal museum, we are able to reconsider and better understand the subtleties of nineteenth-century urban society.

The Emergence of the Modern Museum Jonah Siegel, 2008. In 1820, less than a handful of museums existed on the British Isles, and both their form and function were far from what a visitor today would expect. By the beginning of the first world war, not only had over 400 museums been founded in Great Britain, but their place in culture was recognizably close and often identical to the modern one, whether considered in terms of content, forms of display, or modes of access. Although there has never been a single, simple, and uncontested amount of the character and function of the museum, it is to this period of inception that we may turn for the most urgent and compelling debates as to the nature of institutions that were set up with such effort and expense in England and all over the world. The goal of this anthology is to allow the reader access to primary sources indicative of the history and development of the museum in the nineteenth century, which is to say, at the moment the modern concept took institutional shape in response to the varied social and cultural debates. Review, 2009 *The Representation of Islam in British Museums* Ian Heath, 2007 The role of museums in creating and maintaining both cultural identities and their stereotypes is an area of debate and discourse in both archaeology and museology Despite the long history of the collection and public display of Islamic material there has been no systematic research into either its representation or into public perceptions of these representations This programme of research represents the first such study of the representation of Islamic material culture in British museums This commences with the discussion and evaluation of the history of contact between the Islamic world and Europe in general and Britain in particular Much of the history of this discourse is framed in terms of supra regional identity i e European and Islamic or Muslim These are constructed identities and the history of their construction is discussed before moving on to consider contemporary issues In addressing the subject of the representation of Islam in museums this work undertakes to examine both its production and consumption The production of representation and the creation of identity are achieved in museums through the medium of the display of material whilst consumption occurs through the medium of visiting and the meaning made by visitors In order to evaluate such production displays of Islamic material in museums are the subject of critical analysis This research has a qualitative element and seeks to tap into the perceptions of museum visitors of current museum displays Given the role played by museums in the construction of identity the questions underpinning this are firstly what are the messages they receive about the world of Islam and secondly what do these displays say about the Islamic world past and present
