Passion is inversely proportional to the amount of real information available. That maxim is a quotation from *Timescape* Benford's Nebula and Campbell Award winning 1980 novel which established his work as an exemplar of hard science fiction dedicated to working out the consequences of modern science rather than substituting pseudoscience for fantasy. Like many other current science fiction writers Benford has tackled the major genres space travel time travel technology running amok prolonged longevity searing apocalyptic cosmic events and alien life which he theorizes to be more likely viral than intelligent. An astrophysicist by training and profession Benford has published more than twenty novels over one hundred short stories some fifty essays and myriad articles that display both his scientific rigor as well as a recognition of literary traditions.
