On the other hand the range of uses a sentence can be put to, depending on context, would be the object of study for pragmatics.

Semantics is concerned with sentence meaning and pragmatics with speaker meaning. Knowing the first is part of semantic knowledge and working out the second is a task for one's pragmatic competence.

A semantics/pragmatics division enables semanticists to concentrate on just the linguistic element in utterance comprehension. Pragmatics would then be the field which studies how hearers fill out the semantic structure with contextual information.
