



Effective prompt writing for **Generative AI**

Use Clear Language

- Short sentences
- Familiar language, avoiding complex technical jargon, vague terms, and slang
- Stick to descriptive writing

Be Specific, but Not Too Narrow

- Provide sufficient context
- Provide sufficient constraints. A simple sentence such as "The output should be about 100 words" will suffice

Context Clues

- Tell the AI "you are a sports statistician," or "you are a medical writer"
 - Define your target audience
- Communicate your purpose for creating the content. Will it inform, persuade, or debate a certain topic?
 - What tone of voice should the content use?

Avoid Unethical Queries

- Avoid asking illegal, unethical, or dangerous topics

Monitor Responses

- Is the output what you expected it to be?
- Were false claims or inflammatory statements generated?
- Was information repeated over and over?
