

Communication and the Human Condition W. Barnett Pearce, 1989 Starting with the premise that we live in communication rather than standing outside communication and using it for secondary purposes Pearce claims that people who live in various cultures and historical epochs not only communicate differently but experience different ways of being human because they communicate differently This century he notes ushered in the communication revolution the discovery that communication is far more important and central to the human condition than ever before realized Essential to the communication revolution is the recognition that multiple forms of discourse exist in contemporary human society Further these forms of discourse are not benign they comprise alternative ways of being human Thus communication theory must encompass all that it means to live a life the shape of social institutions and cultural traditions the pragmatics of social action and the poetics of social order The New Popular Educator, 1899

Unhealthy Language: Linguistic Investigations of Covid-19 Discourse Justyna Robinson, Roberta Piazza, Rodney Jones, 2024-10-01 The proposed volume reflects on the Coronavirus pandemic as a still evolving phenomenon and captures critically its socially constructed dimension The papers by well established international contributors deal with a variety of themes that range from the different discourses of the first and second lockdown the comparative responses to Covid in different parts of the world in light of the relationship between language and culture and the reflection of who the actors are who talk and are talked about in relation to the pandemic This last theme in particular offers a wide variety of responses from politicians and health experts communiqués to the voices of marginal individuals and groups like the refugees The overall questions the papers as a whole try to answer is whether the discourses of and around Covid are equalizing or inciting inequality whether they perpetuate existing structures of dominance and exclusion and if and how they contributed to language change The volume offers an opportunity to both discourse analysts and sociolinguists to cross paths and work together The variety of analytic approaches adopted in both linguistic fields from corpus assisted and computational approaches to survey and interview based studies guarantees a ground breaking interdisciplinary volume with contributions designed to include linguistic analysis at all levels including the plane of grammatical description lexis phonology and discourse analysis

Dangerous Encounters Daniel Touro Linger, 1992 This book is about violence in the Brazilian city of São Luis It describes how people think about and negotiate dangerous encounters vital and disturbing experiences that when they go wrong yield moral failure humiliation and death Brazilians like people elsewhere worry about the perils of coming face to face with the wrong person at the wrong time under the wrong circumstances The book discusses two conceptually linked forms of perilous face to face encounters Carnival a bacchanalian festival and briga a potentially lethal street confrontation When playing becomes fighting Carnival's samba

fueled by the controlled venting of dangerous passions gives way to the explosive pas de deux of the street fight Sao Luisenses tell vivid sometimes terrifying stories of verbal and physical confrontations Their narratives based on cultural models of Carnivals and brigas highlight the vulnerability of the self to humiliation by others and the vulnerability of moral controls to one's own hostile emotions The book argues that this double sense of social and psychological vulnerability is a product of Brazilian interpersonal relations which are profoundly marked by the arbitrary exercise of power and the stifling of resentment in subordinates Culture here consists not of shared symbols but of shared quandaries The author suggests that Brazilian street fighting is an alarm bell an inarticulate representation of pressing but poorly understood social and psychological dilemmas Violence in Sao Luis may therefore be a desperate attempt to understand and come to grips with the very resentment rooted in the city's harsh social transactions that engenders it

to the clinical laboratory and finally to clinical treatment No other book distills the basic science and underpinnings of mental disorders and explains the clinical significance to the scope and breadth of this classic text The result is an excellent and cutting edge resource for psychiatric residents psychiatric researchers and doctoral students in neurochemistry and the neurosciences
