New Approaches to Medieval Textuality Mikle D. Ledgerwood, 1998 Only recently has the study of medieval literature gone beyond approaches pioneered in the nineteenth century. The contributors to this volume attack this problem using approaches that range from purely Peircean semiotic to semiotic hermeneutics and reader response. One contributor even speaks of the DOS Disk Operating System of certain medieval texts. This work aims at establishing new ways of discussing medieval textuality with its complexities being discussed at both textual and global levels.

Reading in Manuscript Culture John Dagenais, 1994-02-18 Reexamining the roles played by author, reader, scribe and text in medieval literary practice. John Dagenais argues that the entire physical manuscript must be the basis of any discussion of how meaning was made. Medievalists he maintains have relied too heavily on critical editions that seek to create a single definitive text reflecting an author's intentions. In reality manuscripts bear not only authorial texts but also a variety of elements added by scribes and readers: glosses, marginal notes, pointing hands, illuminations and fragments of other seemingly unrelated works. Using the surviving manuscripts of the fourteenth century *Libro de buen amor* a work that has been read both as didactic treatise on spiritual love and as a celebration of sensual pleasures, Dagenais shows how consideration of the physical manuscripts and their cultural context can shed new light on interpretive issues that have puzzled modern readers. Dagenais also addresses the theory and practice of reading in the Middle Ages showing that for medieval readers the text on the manuscript leaf including the text of the *Libro* was primarily rhetorical and ethical in nature. It spoke to them directly, individually, always in the present moment. Exploring the margins of the manuscripts of the *Libro* and of other Iberian works, Dagenais reveals how medieval readers continually reshaped their texts both physically and ethically as they read and argues that the context of medieval manuscript culture forces us to reconsider such comfortable received notions as text and literature and the theories we have based upon them.

Textual Parameters in Older Languages

Susan C. Herring, Pieter van Reenen, Lene Schøsler, 2001-01-23 *Textual Parameters in Older Languages* takes a contemporary approach to the inherent limitations of using older texts as data for linguistic analysis, drawing on methods of text analysis, pragmatics and sociolinguistics to supplement traditional historical and philological methods. The focus of the book is on the importance of controlling for textual parameters defined by the editors as dimensions of variation associated with texts and their production, including text type, degree of poeticality, orality and dialect.

Most,2024-08-19 Given the limited durability of most textual supports texts must be reproduced if they are to survive And given the proliferation over time of users practices and places which need to have access to the texts that are important for cultural institutions this is particularly true for authoritative texts But the reproduction of texts by traditional means either orally or by hand inevitably produces variations These variations can arise because of inattention confusion misunderstanding deliberate modification physical damage and many other factors In general the more a text is reproduced the more variations are likely to occur But although the fact of textual variation in general is doubtless an anthropological universal the specific forms it takes and the specific attitudes to its occurrence seem to vary widely from culture to culture How variations develop in different cultures on the basis of which forms of scholarly practices collaborations and institutional frameworks what variants say about a culture's understandings of text authorship and collective authorship what happens when variants become creative and generate their own strands of tradition to what degree changes in transmission media and processes of distribution translations or the migration of texts into different cultural or institutional contexts can influence or be influenced by the development of variants these are the questions that this book addresses in a historical and culturally comparative perspective
