Kaminsky,2021-04-01 The Other Argentina looks at literature film and the visual arts to examine the threads of Jewishness that create patterns of meaning within the fabric of Argentine self representation A multiethnic yet deeply Roman Catholic country Argentina has worked mightily to fashion itself as a modern nation In so doing it has grappled with the paradox of Jewishness emblematic both of modernity and of the lingering traces of the premodern By the same token Jewishness is woven into but also other to Argentineity Consequently books movies and art that reflect on Jewishness play a significant role in shaping Argentina s cultural landscape In the process they necessarily inscribe and sometimes confound norms of gender and sexuality Just as Jewishness seeps into Argentina Argentina s history politics and culture mark Jewishness and alter its meaning The feminized body of the Jewish male for example is deeply rooted in Western tradition but the stigmatized body of the Jewish prostitute and the lacerated body of the Jewish torture victim acquire particular significance in Argentina Furthermore Argentina s iconic Jewish figures include not only the peddler and the scholar but also the Jewish gaucho and the urban mobster troubling conventional readings of Jewish masculinity As it searches for threads of Jewishness richly imbued with the complexities of gender and sexuality The Other Argentina explores the patterns those threads weave however overtly or subtly into the fabric of Argentine national meaning especially at such critical moments in Argentine history as the period of massive state sponsored immigration the rise of labor and anarchist movements the Per n era and the 1976 83 dictatorship In arguing that Jewishness is an essential element of Argentina s self fashioning as a modern nation the book shifts the focus in Latin American Jewish studies from Jewish identity to the meaning of Jewishness for the nation This book is freely available in an open access edition thanks to the National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowships Open Book Program a limited competition designed to make outstanding humanities books available to a wide

Heather Renee Sottong, 2025-04-01 Opens the field of Dante Studies to further transnational studies of the Divine Comedy's circulation, translation, and global influence. This fascinating book examines how Dante was repurposed by Argentine politicians and authors who were concerned with the construction of Argentine national identity in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Sottong's work is informed by the theories of Eric Hobsbawm, Benedict Anderson, and Nicolas Shumway, who coined the concepts of invented traditions, imagined communities, and guiding fictions, respectively. Sottong has applied these notions to the case of Argentina, which after the War of Independence from Spain (1810-1818) had to develop its own national cultural identity. In this volume, she investigates Dante's transnational influence in Argentina. Why did Argentine authors consistently call upon Dante in their attempts to develop Argentine literature? What are the textual and thematic characteristics of Dante's Divine Comedy that make it an ideal vehicle for literary appropriation? What are the historical and cultural factors that account for Dante's enduring popularity in Italy and beyond? How did the strong presence of Italians in Argentina influence cultural production in the developing nation? And how are the re-writings of Dante in the Argentine canon in dialogue with one another? What Sottong found remarkably was that rewriting Dante was a way for Argentine authors to voice their views on the direction that should be taken to develop Argentine letters. Dante became something of a literary guide as Argentine intellectuals navigated the complex labyrinth of their national identity. The consistent rewriting of the Divine Comedy in the Argentine context testifies to the fact that great works of literature can be revived during different periods and even reappropriated by various peoples to foster mythologies of inclusion or exclusion related to national identity.
