Although headquartered in Chicago Sheridan played a crucial role in the opening of the West. His command stretched from the Missouri to the Rockies and from Mexico to Canada and all the Indian Wars of the Great Plains fell under his direction. Hutton ably narrates and interprets Sheridan's western career from the perspective of the top command rather than the battlefield leader. His book is good history and good reading. Kopp,2009 Oregon has been the home of nearly three hundred communal experiments since the Aurora Colony was established in 1856 Eden Within Eden is the first book to survey the state s utopian history from religious and Socialist groups of the nineteenth century to ecologically conscious communities of the twenty first century James J Kopp examines Oregon s communal history in the context of the state as a destination for those seeking new beginnings and in the framework of utopian and communal experiences across America Eden Within Eden provides rich detail about utopian communities some realized some only planned many of which reflect broader social political economic and cultural aspects of Oregon s history From the dawn of communal groups in Oregon the German Christian colony at Aurora to Oregon s most infamous communal experiment Rajneeshpuram this study examines the range of attempts to establish ideal communities in the state These include the Jewish agrarian colony of New Odessa in the 1880s as well as the new pioneers of the 1960s and later who captured the spirit of the counterculture as well as growing concerns about the environment The book explores other areas of Oregon s utopian heritage as well including literary works and idealistic city planning There has been no comparable book published on Oregon s communal history and few such comprehensive examinations of other states The appendix is a rich compilation that will guide individuals to additional information on the profiled and many other communities Eden Within Eden will appeal to students and scholars of communal studies and Pacific Northwest history as well as to general readers interested in these subjects *Public Administration Series--Bibliography* ,1983 *Alternative Futures* ,1979 **Oregon's Promise** David Peterson del Mar,2003 The first history of Oregon to appear in twenty five years Oregon s Promise explores familiar and neglected people and movements in the state s history while challenging readers to view Oregon s past present and future in a new way David Peterson del Mar recognizes that the words Oregon history conjure up images of Lewis and Clark and rugged pioneers But he argues that the explorers impact was both different from and less significant than commonly assumed and that the state s settlers were much more varied contentious complicated and interesting than conventional heroic stereotypes would suggest Oregon s Promise is a concise general history spanning the period from that of the region s earliest inhabitants to the present It moves beyond the more familiar episodes of Oregon history to discuss indigenous peoples before and after contact with whites the profound and evolving impact of broad forces like industrialization and suburbanization and the varied fortunes of a growing stream of

people from across the world who have sought the good life in Oregon. It explores the tensions behind contemporary disagreements rending our political, social, and cultural fabric. The book's many themes revolve around Peterson del Mar's consideration of how Oregonians have attempted to build a prosperous and just society. He examines both the traditional center of Oregon history and its often overlooked margins: the people who have struggled to be included in Oregon's promise. Each chapter includes brief biographies of noteworthy Oregonians. David Peterson del Mar is both a respected historian and an engaging writer with a talent for explaining Oregon's past in a way that will appeal to general readers as well as to scholars and students.

Earthlight, Wordfire Elizabeth Simpson, 1992. Elizabeth Simpson has written this first comprehensive book-length study of Ivan Doig's work for Doig fans as well as for scholars. While the central focus is Doig's work, Simpson also suggests new ways western writing can be examined in terms of folklore, history, landscape, and style. Well-known Doig novels including *This House of Sky*, *Run with Me*, *Mariah*, *Montana*, *Winter Brothers*, *English Creek*, and *The Sea Runners* are analyzed separately with attention to structure, narrative strategy, theme, character, pace, tone, and informing metaphors. Recurrent motifs that bind Doig's work into a canon are also explored. The reader is introduced to changes in folklore studies in the past few decades, followed by an examination of the impact these changes have had on literature. Doig's use of folklore to develop character and theme to regulate pace and tension also allows him to paint the life of the region he is writing about. As well, Doig's use of folklore suggests ways to link the history of the West with a meaningful present. Doig's writing also emphasizes the interrelationships between landscape and the people who live in it. In the second part of this study, Elizabeth Simpson addresses the concept of profane and sacred space and adversity as means that western writers use to perceive the relationship between character and landscape. The classic western myth of the solitary hero against the wilderness is not the focus of contemporary western writing where instead community takes on special meaning. One of the prevalent contemporary themes is the physical and psychological danger of isolation. While individually Doig's books may differ from each other, they form a distinct corpus because the author's use of context informs the text. As Elizabeth Simpson concludes after examining Doig's style, Doig is in the most inclusive sense of the term a regional writer.
