

This curriculum guide applies Gardner's theory of multiple intelligences to the kindergarten class providing teachers with a practical thematic approach that will challenge children's thinking. The five units include three lessons for each of the intelligences: linguistic, logical, mathematical, spatial, artistic, inter and intra personal, social, spatial, assembly, bodily, kinesthetic, and musical. Some lessons include homework designed to strengthen the communication between home and school and some include designated portfolio samples with format suggestions for collection throughout the school year. The five units are 1. Self, 2. Fall, 3. Day/Night, 4. Winter, and 5. Castles. Each unit includes a bibliography.
